"A refugee is someone who is unable or unwilling to return to their country of origin owing to a well- founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, membership of a particular social group or political opinion." (Refugee Convention, 1951)

Statistics

The numbers of refugees around the world are currently the highest they have ever been in global history. 82.4 million people have been displaced worldwide, of whom 26.6 million are recognized as refugees as stated by the UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees). There is a significant need for communal spaces for refugees that offer training and working facilities with an emphasis on their successful integration into society. The longer the period of inactivity and exclusion from mainstream tasks, such as work and social activities, the more challenging the process of integration gets (Amnesty International, 2022).

Site analysis



The Anglican Church of St. James is located on Malcolm Street in the innercity area of Derby.


Listed as a grade II heritage property, the 525m² symmetrically designed building consisting of a central nave with an arcade that separates the north, and the south aisles, was built in 1866 by the architect Joseph Peacock (Eaton, 2007).

escription

Most, if not all, significant churches across the UK are protected by architectural heritage. Therefore, a key solution for abandoned church buildings would be the adaptive repurpose of them. This includes designing the space in a way that reinstates its value which leads to the following research question:

'Can the design of an abandoned church in Derby enhance integration and cultural exchange of refugees?' This question, linked with design as well as social and communal aspects, poses many potential avenues to explore. However, a valuable response to it comes from relating three main objectives: refugees, derelict churches and biophilic design, to a proposed intervention for an existing church.

St. James' Church has therefore been chosen for this project to fully demonstrate a potential approach for the successful reuse of such a building due to its recent history of disuse and closure.



Refugees from all over the world are welcome to 'ReStart'.












In the entrance area, visitors and refugees can get general information about the project 'ReStart' and all the facilities that are in the building.




Entrance area with reception desk (V1)






Restaurant with seating area, bar and mezzanine (V3)
