
# CHAMBAL-RESORT RECEPTION

The reception is the starting point of every guest's safari journey. A welcoming space designed to spark excitement and curiosity from the moment they arrive. Inspired by the Indian folktale, The Wishing Tree, the area blends storytelling with design, creating a warm and inviting atmosphere. The space includes a reception desk, a relaxed seating area for waiting guests, and natural textures throughout.

The design features a palette of soft neutrals, complemented by pops of muted red tones that echo the desert landscape where the story is set. The walls feature Zinc Textile's Monazite woven wall covering that reflects the soft, flowing movement of desert sands, with subtle shimmers that catch the light like sun on dunes.

# CHAMBAL RESORT RESTAURANT

The restaurant is a vibrant celebration of culture and creativity. An immersive space inspired by the lively colours and bold patterns of Patrika Gate. Brightly painted walls, patterned textiles, and bespoke details reflect the joyful energy of the gate itself, creating a dynamic setting that feels both welcoming and exciting. The layout is thoughtfully divided into two distinct areas: a lively, family-friendly section for bigger partys, and a more serene dining space designed for adults to enjoy a peaceful meal. From the colourful tiled floors to bespoke wall panelling, every element tells a story.

In this area, low seating inspired by authentic Indian design creates a relaxed and intimate atmosphere. Partition walls between each seating arrangement offer privacy without disrupting the flow of the space, ensuring guests can enjoy a more personal experience. The varied seating options, from cosy corners to larger group settings, cater to different needs while maintaining a sense of openness and comfort.






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

# CHAMBAL RESORT RESTAURANT

Tall seating is positioned in front of beautiful brass partitions, which reflect light throughout the space and create a detailed backdrop. Inspired by the intricate designs seen at Patrika Gate, these partitions add both structure and softness to the restaurant, dividing zones without blocking the vibrant atmosphere. As the light shifts across the metal, it enhances the space with a soft shimmer, adding depth and drama to the overall design.



The bar features pink fluted tiles along its sides, paired with a sleek marble counter top for a refined, contemporary finish. A decorative element runs above the bar - delicate brass detailing in a floral pattern, where glassware is suspended. Integrated lighting within the brass details casts a warm glow, creating intricate shadows that enhance the atmosphere and add a touch of story-telling to the space.

Plants surround many of the seating areas, creating a sense of privacy and bringing life into the space. ## CHAMBAL RESORT RESTAURANT OUTSIDE SEATING AND LIVE COOKING



These seating areas, which include Jhula swings, charpais, and more, offer a comfortable and authentic setting for guests. A stunning mosaic of trees, inspired by Patrika Gate, mirrors the nature from outside, creating a seamless connection between the interior and the outdoor surroundings.

On the terrace, guests will also find a live cooking station where staff demonstrate how naan bread is made, a fun and interactive experience for both children and adults that adds a touch of luxury to the visit.

## CHAMBAL RESORT KIDS' ZONE




LIVING AREA AND TERRACE

The rich colours of the painting have also influenced the overall palette, bringing warmth and depth to the space. The backs of the dining chairs take inspiration from the architectural forms seen in the background of the painting, recreated using embroidered fabrics to add texture and cultural reference to the room.

The kitchen features bespoke cabinets crafted with traditional Indian materials and intricate detailing, bringing authenticity and cultural richness to the heart of the villa.



## CHAMBAL RESORT THE VILLA MASTER BEDROOM



The master bedroom is inspired by the Mithila wedding painting, with soft pastel tones of pink, yellow, and blue guiding the overall colour palette. Elements from the artwork, such as the bird being gifted and the delicate floral patterns in the background, are reflected in the room's textiles and details. The skirting around the base of the room mimics the decorative top border of the painting, adding a subtle storytelling feature that ties the design together in a calm and elegant way. The room also includes bespoke wardrobes and a softly arched entrance to the shower, with an open en-suite design that places a free-standing bath within the bedroom for a calm, spa-like atmosphere.



# CHAMBAL RESORT THE VILLA TWIN BEDROOM

The twin bedroom is inspired by the Maharani Princess painting, with every detail carefully considered to reflect its delicate beauty. The floral elements in the artwork are echoed through a mix of flower motif fabrics used across bedding and soft furnishings, creating a gentle feel. The bespoke wardrobe features an arched shape that mirrors the architectural backdrop in the painting, adding a subtle yet striking design feature. Even the trimmings have been thoughtfully chosen - taking inspiration from the beaded details in the princess's headwear, they add a touch of refinement and storytelling to the space.


