






Current space used in site: 3D model. Negative space: 3D model.

FORENSIC EXPLORATIONS









The initial atmospheric fast models sparked ideas about forensic approach exploration that accompanied me throughout the entire project.














Exploring atmospheric iterations helped me find the initial ideas and qualities using laser cut workshop, model making, sketching, and tracing clues of the existing Car Wash site.




The building is an agora for the publishing company; it is open 24/7. This storyboard is divided into three parts representing what is happening in different building parts: transition spaces, ground floor and first-floor areas.

TRANSITION SPACES



Social Heart Area - From here you can see almost every part of the building through which the drive-through runs, which is opened for several hours a day. Visitors in cars can observe the processes in the building. On leaving they can buy a mystery book.







Stairs - lead to the first floor.





Writers / Readers open area - Here is one of the areas where writers and readers can choose to make investigations, write mysteries, read and discuss. Each furnishing device is equipped with rolls of paper for drawing and writing, and there are also built-in shelves for paper.





Atrium in social heart area - Here forensic lectures are held, and various unsolved murder cases are discussed. The sittings, the road that runs through a part of this floor, and the suspended pages with stories that proceed to print are a reflection of the shape of the road that runs across the building on the ground level.





Print / bind zone - Here, the workers pick up handwritten mystery stories on the paper clipped to suspended chains on an automated conveyor mounted from the ceiling.




Writers / Readers semi-private area - It is a place to work for people who need some more privacy but still want to observe and listen to what is going on in the social heart.




Writers / Readers private pocket

and case files on the shelves.






Printing paper cutting area -Here, workers select the paper, cut it and print the mystery stories.







GROUND FLOOR PLAN SCALE: 1:200 A2




FIRST FLOOR PLAN SCALE: 1:200 A2




SECTION BB SCALE: 1:200 A2






Numbers indicate the location from where the view of each visual has been taken, and arrows show the camera target.







ROOF: Frosted tempered glass panels let the light in and create semi-privacy. You could see ,shadows' of the people during the night, which gives a sense of mystery. Steel frames and beams hold the structure, stairs, conveyors and furnishing devices.

THE CONVEYOR: is suspended from the ceiling in the shape of a road that runs through the building. On chains, handwritten stories circulate throughout the building, waiting to be printed.

FIRST FLOOR: Concrete structure partially held on two existing horizontal beams. Here is a social heart: an atrium with a frosted glass panel that is a continuation of the panel from the downstairs, a road below the conveyor belt that resembles the drive-thru road from the ground floor, writing and reading suspended furnishing devices; part of the printing zone with binding machines

STAIRS: Steel structure located near the entrance on the ground floor leading to the first floor. All parts of the stairs are suspended from the roof.

LIFT: Industrial car lift secured with steel railings. It's an alternative to the stairs that accessible visitors could use, and it's used to transport the visitors with trolleys that carry boxes with criminal cases, evidence and rolls of papers.

GROUND FLOOR:

Ground floor: On this level is located: a cloakroom; a drivethru road that runs through the whole building and ends with a mystery book pick-up;writing/reding areas: Open, semi-private and private; frosted glass panel that writes can use to draw on in and pinup cases; paper pick-up and storing space; cutting and printing area.
