





SITE COMBINE MODEL THAT INSPIRED

RATIONALE

Situated in the centre of the Steel City, The Eyewitness Works lies frozen in time for over a century. This historic building was one of Sheffield's last functioning steel works, home to cutlery manufactures Taylors Eye Witness. Over the past few decades, Sheffield's manufacturing past has slowly diminished and instead, the only knives now talked about, are those used to commit crimes.

In the past ten years knife crime in South Yorkshire has more than doubled, with almost a thousand incidents in 2018 alone. The aim of this major project is to help combat these statistics, working alongside charities and organisations already in place, to reduce knife crime and antisocial behaviour, of young people in Sheffield, whilst paying homage to the building's industrial past.

The Grade II Listed building, located on Milton Street in Sheffield city centre, was home to Taylors Eye Witness from the 19th century up until 2018, when the company was relocated by Sheffield City Council.

The proposed site will feature:

- A Knife depository for members of the public who are uncomfortable with going to the police but want to dispose of knives in their possession
- Community, Charity and Events space providing young people with a safe place to spend their free
- Cookery school, Bar and Restaurant & Food hall provide young ex-offenders with skills, experience, and a temporary source of income, allowing them to look for long term employment.

The project will tap back into the building's roots, sending the steel recycled from the deposited knives to Taylors Eye Witness, where the steel will be reforged into new recycled cutlery, to be sold and used within the restaurant and food hall.

The design process was largely inspired by the history of the site, but also the effect that knife crime rates have had on Sheffield and its reputation. A major cut through running along the axis from North to South, slices the building in two, representing how, as a city, Sheffield is becoming divided due to the impacts of increasing knife crime. This axis then became the core design move, influencing further development and circulation routes.

















1:200 SITE AND CIRCULATION MODEL

PROCESS DIAGRAM TO SHOW HOW KNIVES MOVE THROUGH THE SITE












