




Colour Rational















Concept

Site Analysis

47/49 Tanner Street in London, famously known as "The Ugly Duck," boasts a rich and diverse history. Originally constructed as a **Victorian warehouse**, the building's industrial charm and architectural character reflect the bygone era of 19th-century

The building is a total of 1,017m2 across 3 floors, many of the original features are still present today. The original building has three stories with **exposed** brick walls, wooden beams, and floorboards.
