The Ballet Baths aims to make ballet an enjoyable part of everyday life. Could rethinking ballet performance spaces help diversify the ballet industry?


WHERE?

Ballet needs to adapt to a more inclusive modern world and this space could help bring together a diverse community.






the solution

In an increasingly inter-connected, diverse world it seems that ballet has some catching up to do. If the ballet industry doesn't push harder for inclusivity, there is a danger that ballet as a whole could be left in the past.

The Ballet Baths aims to break down the social barriers within the ballet industry whilst bringing together the diverse community of Hackney. By designing with a user-centred approach the space intends to welcome all with a vibrant, inclusive atmosphere. Showcasing different cultural dances, inclusive graffiti messages, multi-cultural textiles, and inclusive dancewear are just a few ways The Ballet Baths aims to achieve social sustainability.

By diversifying ballet and promoting a more casual approach to ballet participation, this project aspires to breakdown the strict, elitist stereotype of ballet and instead encourage a fun, social and casual enjoyment of ballet which celebrates diversity.

A pop-up architectural insertion inspired by paper toy theatres provides ultimate flexibility so the space can be adapted to suit rehearsals or performances.









Backdrops can be lowered to divide the space into multiple rehearsal studios..

LABANOTATION SYMBOLS

Labanotation is a system for recording human movement and dance choreography invented by Hungarian Rudolf Von Laban in the 1920s.


The symbols are repeated around the space, most significantly in the facade of the backstage tower where they frame glimpses of the dancers behind.













Translucent materials highlight the silhouettes of dancers backstage whilst respecting their modesty.











The seating area for The Barre overlooks the practice areas adjoining the backstage tower. With the ballet gym also on display and visible from The Barre, ballet rehearsals which are often hidden from sight are now at the forefront.

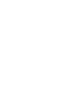




MULTI-CULTURAL PATTERNS - softfurnishings are upholstered in multi-cultural fabrics representing the diverse ethnicities in Hackney

BAMBOO - a frame of bamboo scaffolding that wraps around the staircase to support the translucent scrim fabric









The entrance will provide a space to buy tickets for the theatre whilst also showcasing the diversity of the dancers with inclusive dance-wear..

Translucent materials highlight silhouettes of the dancers backstage, revealing the often hidden side of ballet.

Functional, lightweight materials contrasting with the raw existing material quality of The Baths creates an unconventional, low-key and playful atmosphere to the theatre.
