


'Homosexuality is compared to a fishbone caught in the church's throat that the church can neither eject nor swallow entirely' (Nugent and Gramick, 2008).


An exhibition that portrays the authority the Catholic church has had over young children for the past century, which has revealed numerous cases of sexual abuse on young children in recent decades. The space integrates itself around and through the ruins of Inchcolm Abbey situated on Inchcolm Island. The project title is a play on the statement said before making confession and is an open apology to the abused children from the church.



Inspired by Isak Danielson's song Almost Heaven - which portrays the too common situation of gay love longing for the feeling of utopia and acceptance from society - the design proposal sees the abbey's old church ruins lifted to a new height, physically. This conveys a new beginning for religion and it's relationship with homosexuality. It allows the past to be left below, unharmed and still visible but not touching the new structure to the naked eye.

5/ TOWER


This void space has been inhabited by a two-way staircase that transports the user to the viewpoint.

Ground Floor Plan (NTS)




First Floor Plan (NTS)








THE NEW CHURCH

A new structure has been erected from the foundations using the plans of the old church as a base. 




































Detail Axonometric
