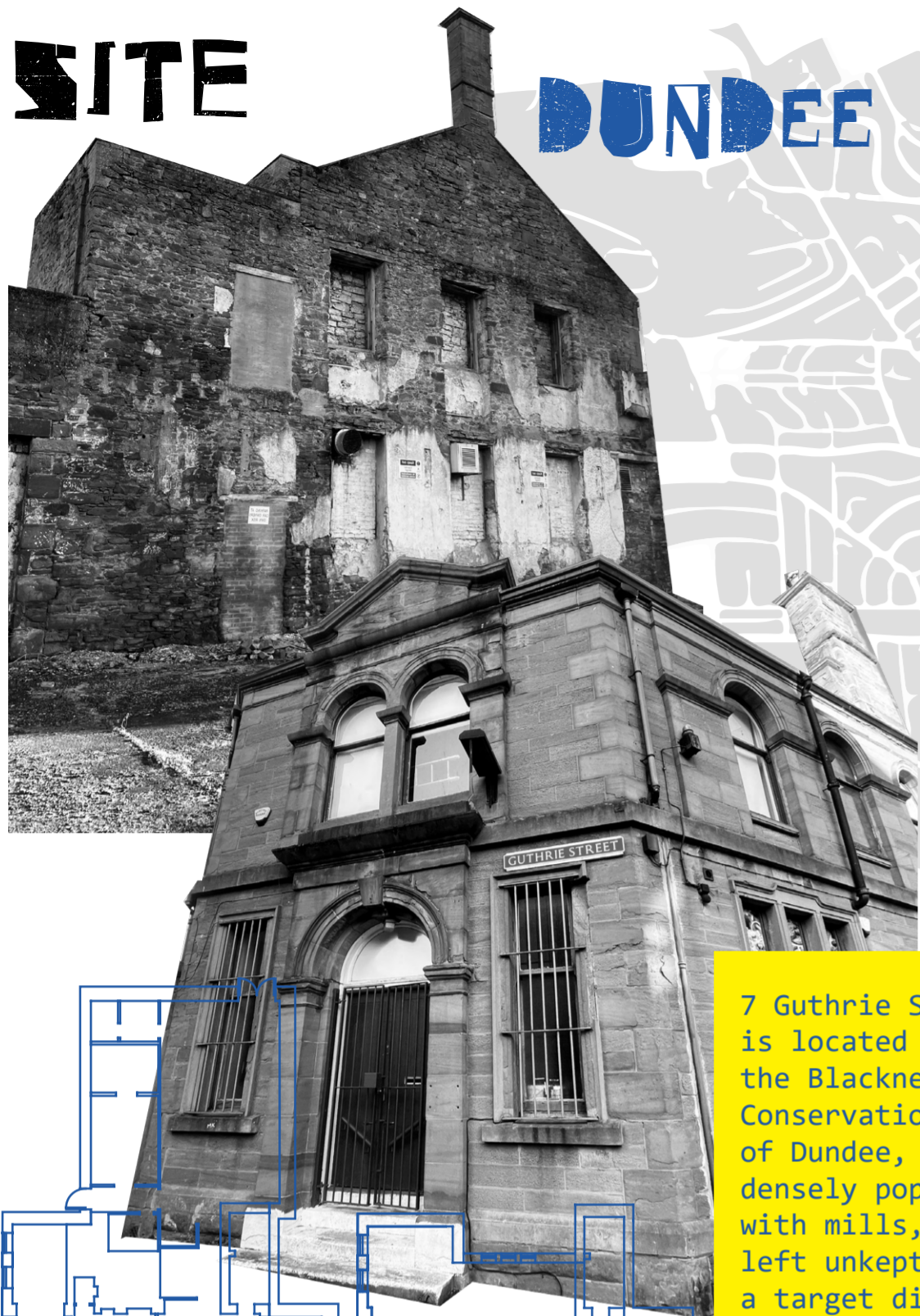


HAME Dundee aims to provide a new living experience for everyone, and offer an alternative to those who otherwise might face deep isolation. Targeted at people aged 18-25 and 65+, the unit wants to bridge a gap between two generations who are quite often at odds with each other. By creating spaces for them to interact and create meaningful relationships, while also giving them room to assert independence, the different age groups will be able to create a harmonious environment where they can learn and grow together. The Unit is also set in an old community centre within the Blackness Conservation Area of Dundee; left derelict for years, this project has the opportunity to uplift and transform the formal industrial district and spread a regenerative spirit throughout the city. The local community would be encouraged to contribute and grow with the scheme, with spaces provided to facilitate this.

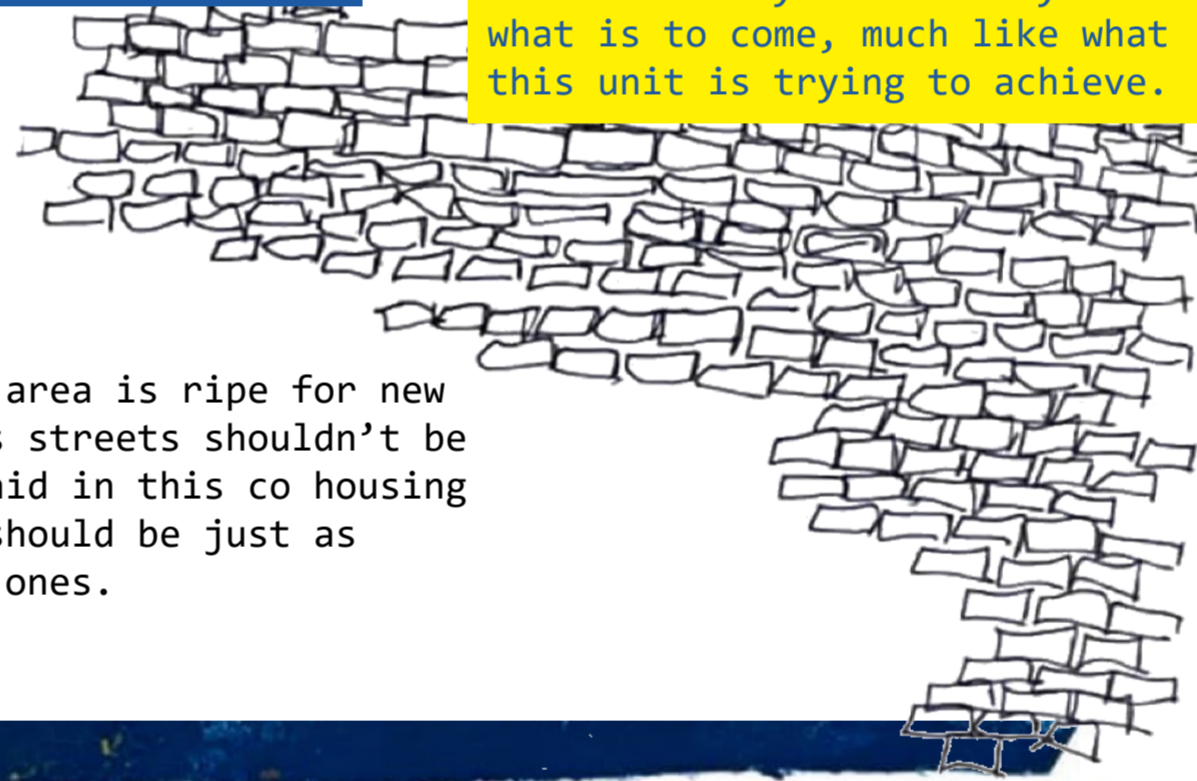

### NEW AND OLD

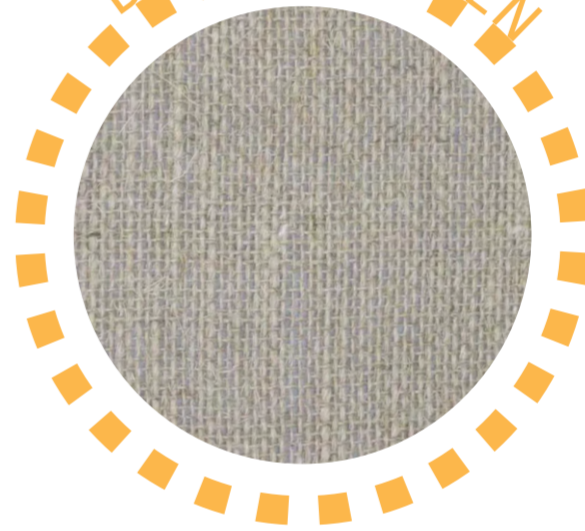

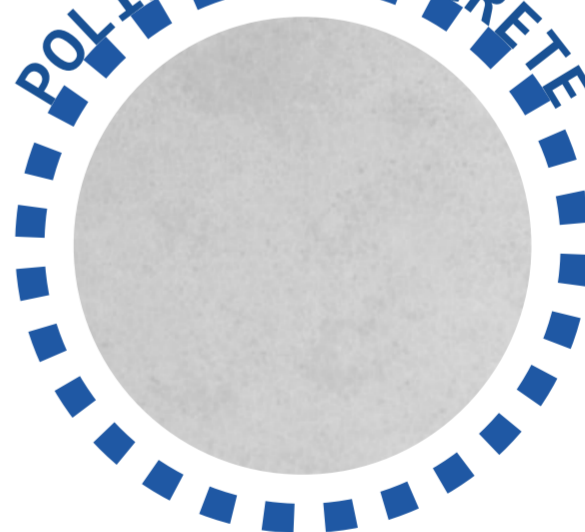

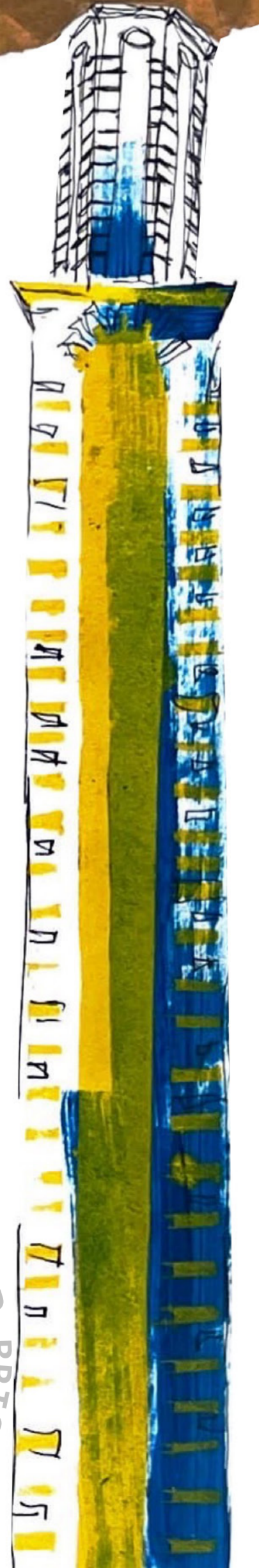

- outdoor community space for a breath of fresh air



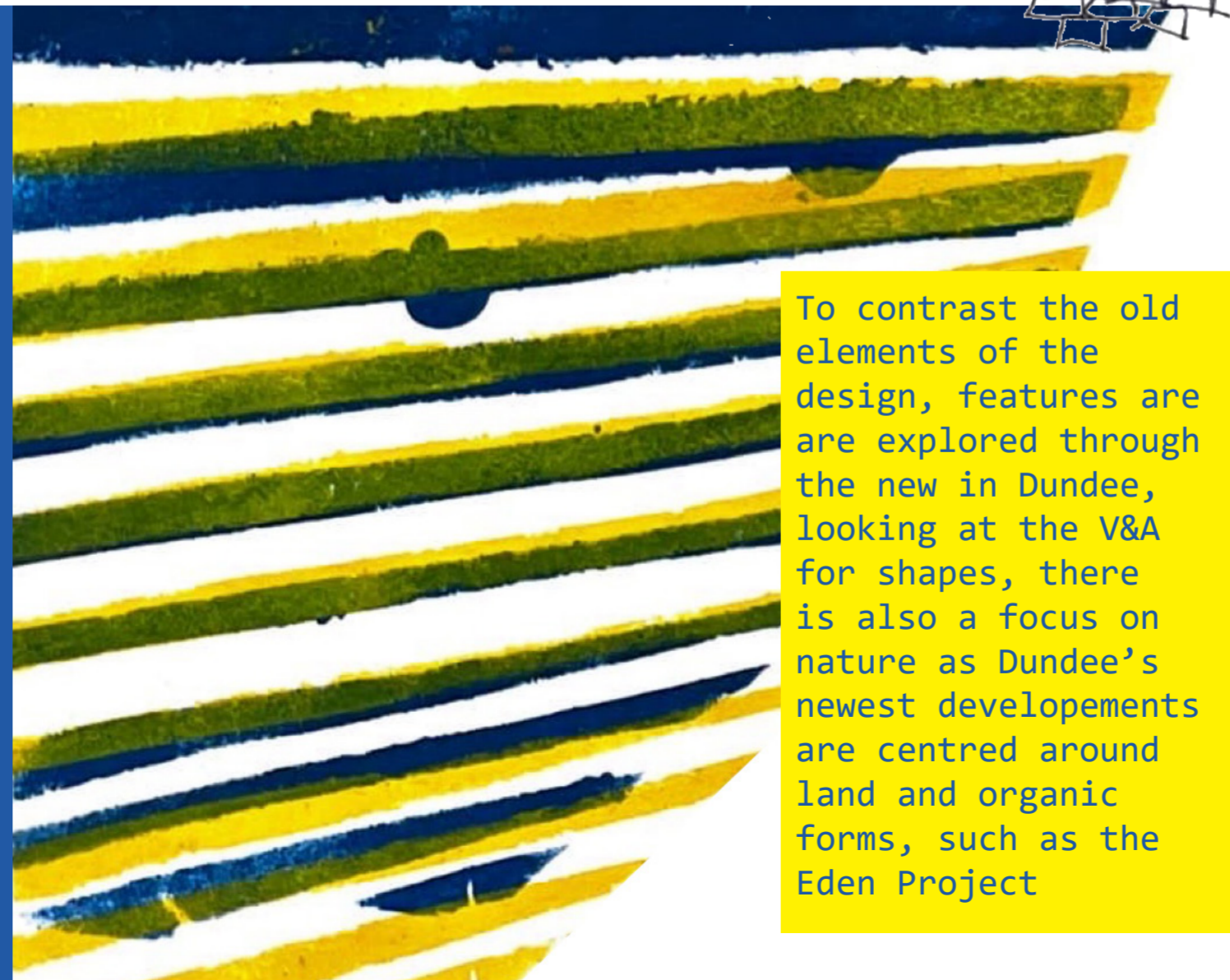
### MARMALADE LANE

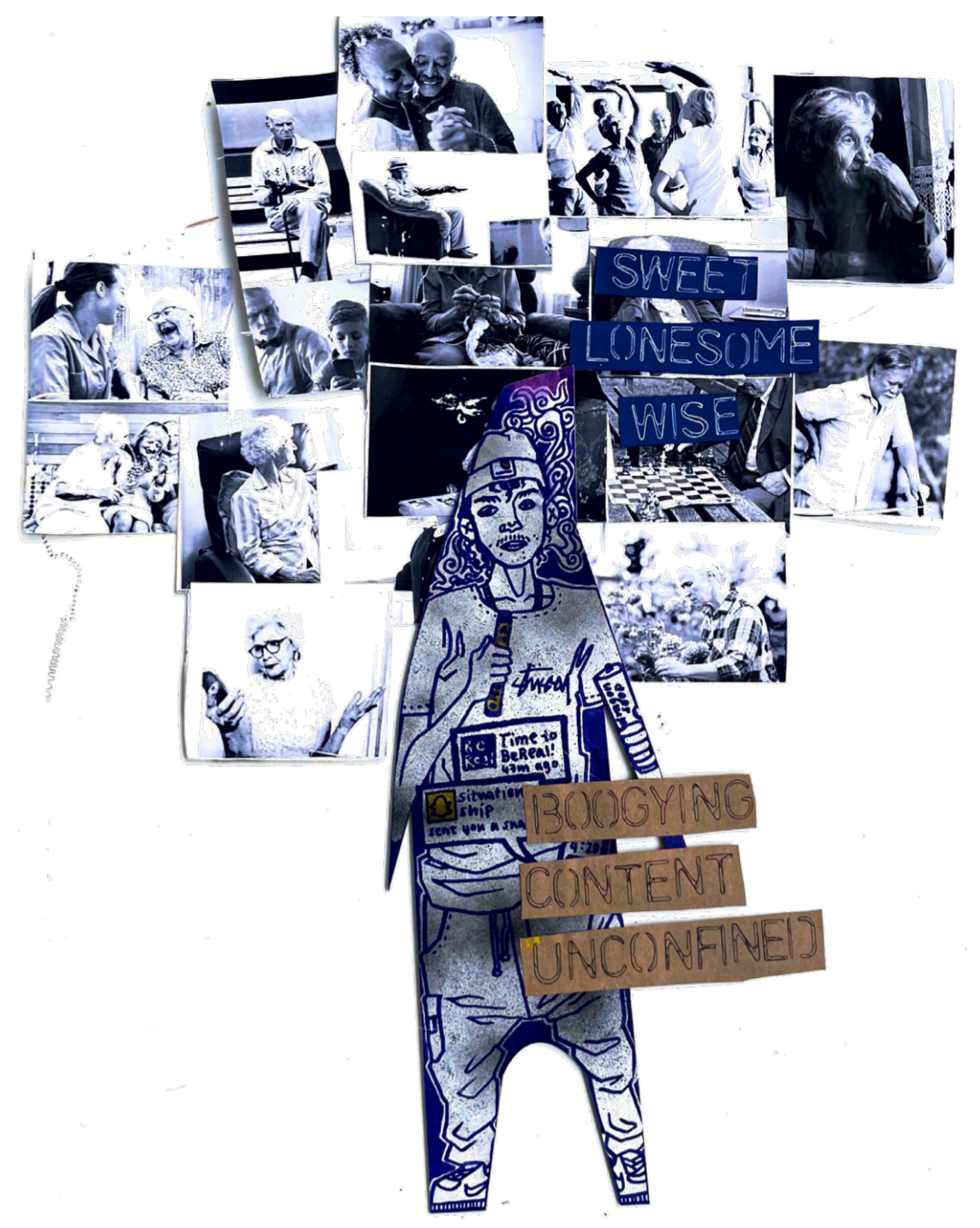

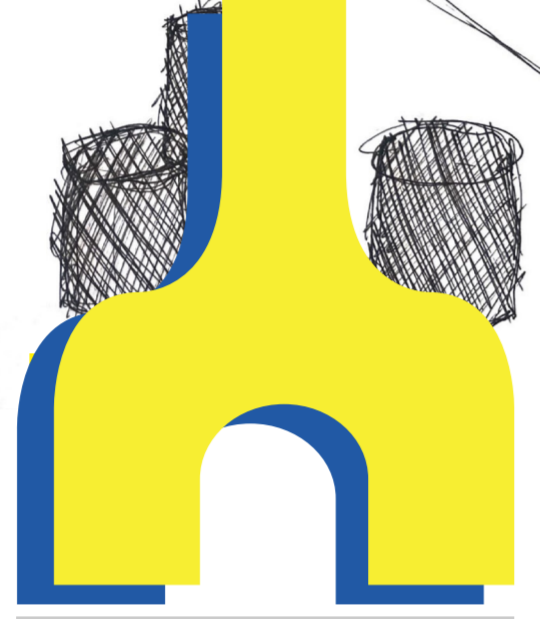
# ENGAGEMENT TASK

An engagement task was also carried out, with two participants living in student accommodation and the other being a more elderly person living alone. Through activities of collage and word association, insights were gathered that showed a shared want for a space to be by themselves while also showing a positive view on the other age group, inviting a environment to induce intergenerational connection.



OPEN UP

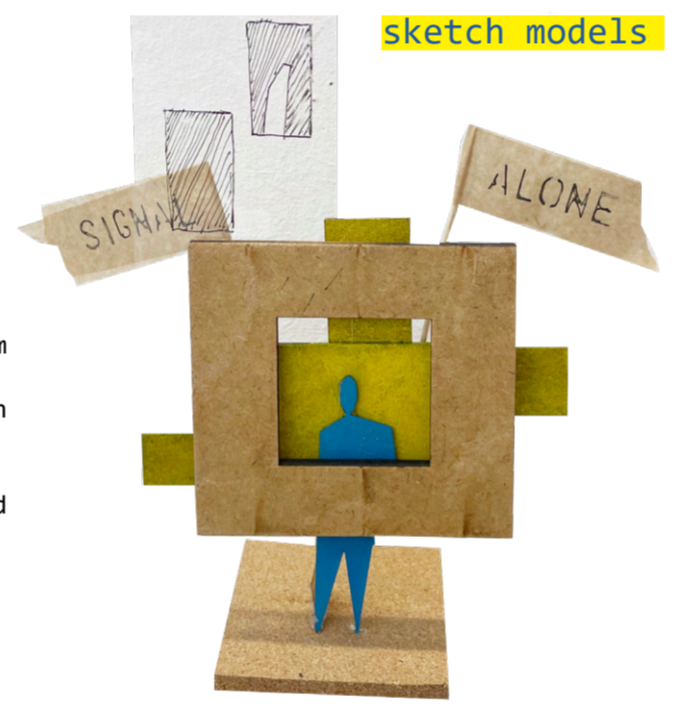
Windows are fitted in every room looking out into the hallways, allowing passing residents to stop for a quick chat. A signal system is used, with an open window they are open to chat, a closed window means they don't mind if someone comes knocking, and a closed curtain signifies they do not want to be disturbed.



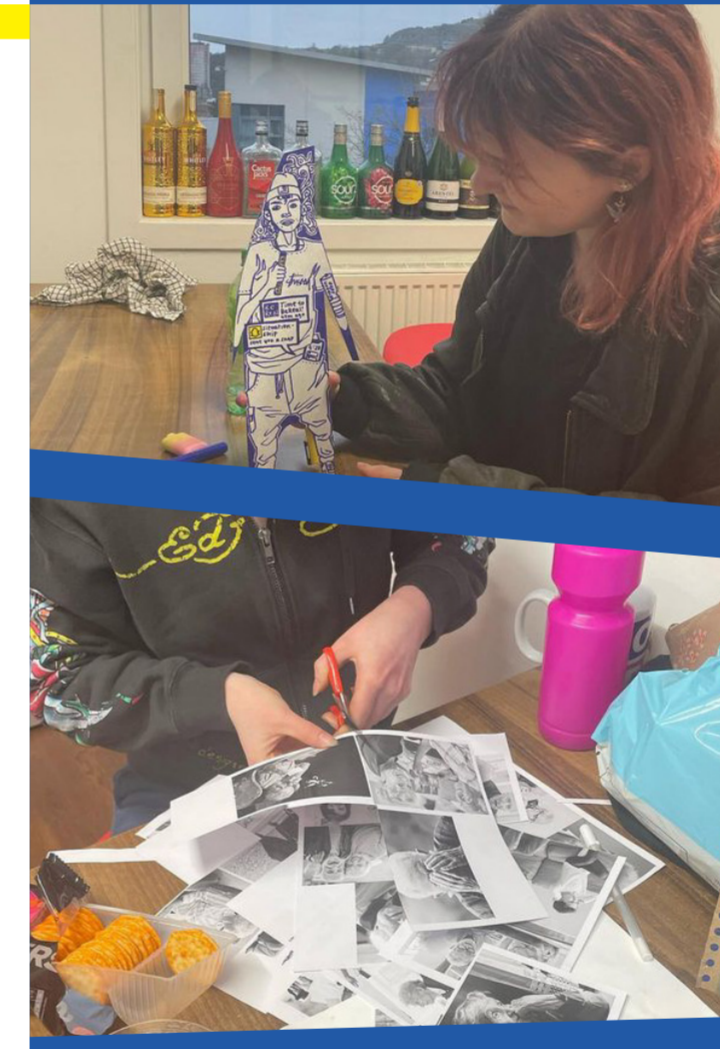
HEARTH

There are two fire places in the unit, one in the community space for cold winter nights, and one in the wider community space, perfect for late summer evenings and barbeques, for sharing stories and creating memories.

Development of the design started with sketchbook work, using different sketch and print methods to explore the shapes and forms of the building, and taking themes from this and the surrounding area to create a cohesive design language. One of the themes that developed was around the chimneys of Dundee, a historic feature of the city. They are also linked to the idea of hearth, so by creating a community feeling around this allows the older and younger residents to form relationships. This was also further developed through sketch modelling. Making the ideas 3D helped visualise the space, especially with zoning, to see how the space could be most effectively used. Through this process, windows became an important part of the design, letting people have a peak into other peoples lives, and so they were implemented into the interior.

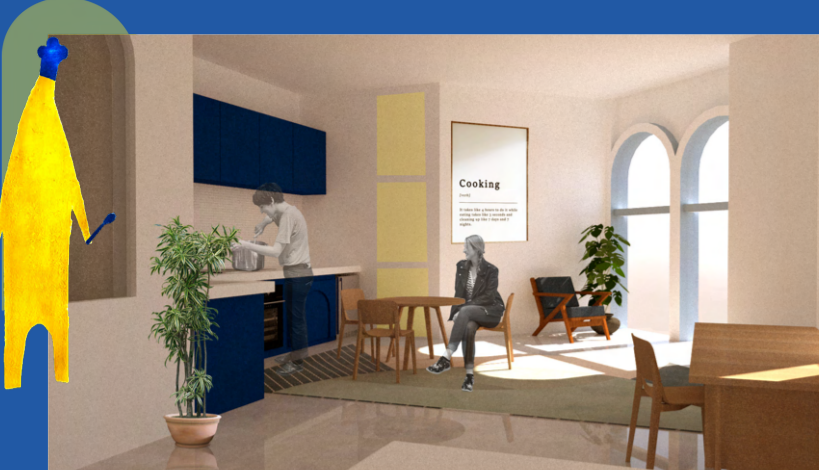

## THE COOK

- Larger kitchen space
- More space to entertain

- Large room and desk to allow for new inventions
- lots of space around the building to exhibit their creations



## THE SOCIAL BUTTERFLY

- large living space in apartment for entertaining
- windows into hallways to have quick conversations with neighbours
- large communal areas to have more relaxed social interaction and bigger social functions



## THE ATHLETE

- lots of floor space
- flexible communal areas that could be used for more intense workouts and training of others

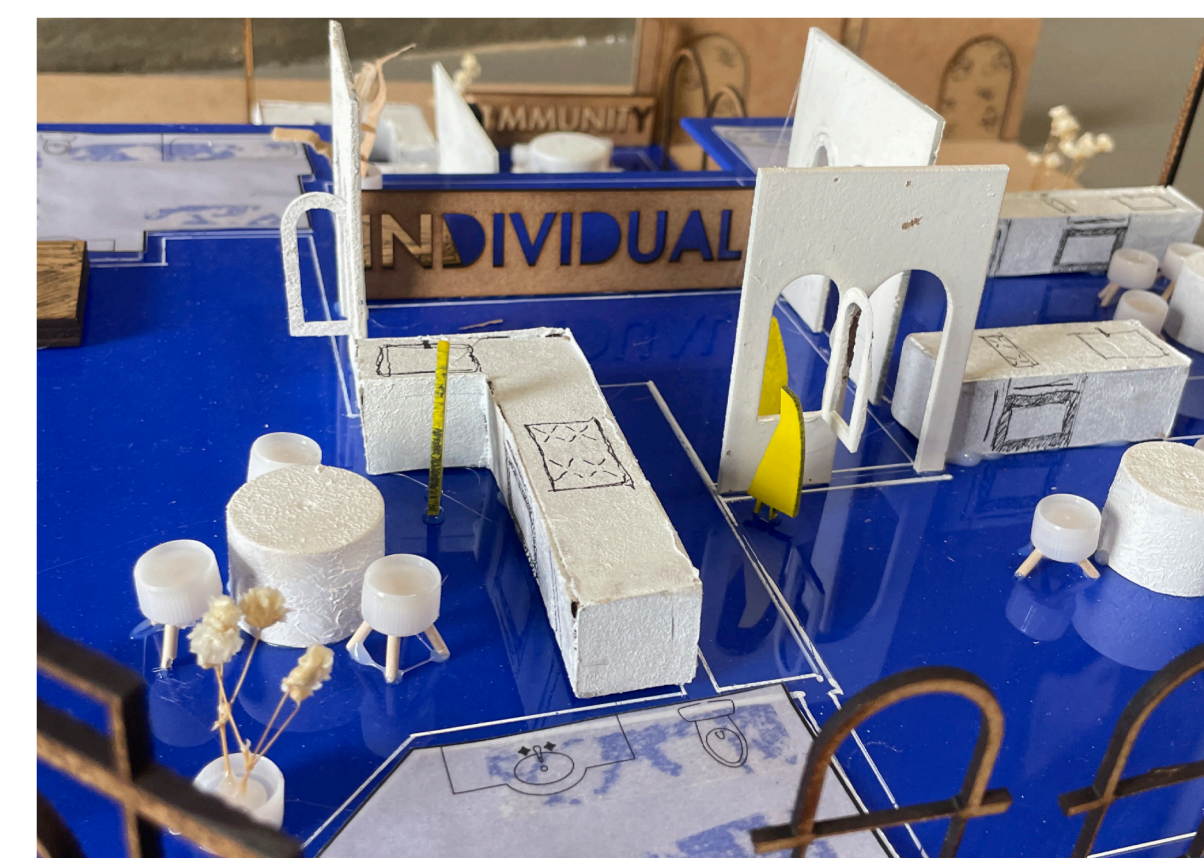

final Model - scale 1:50



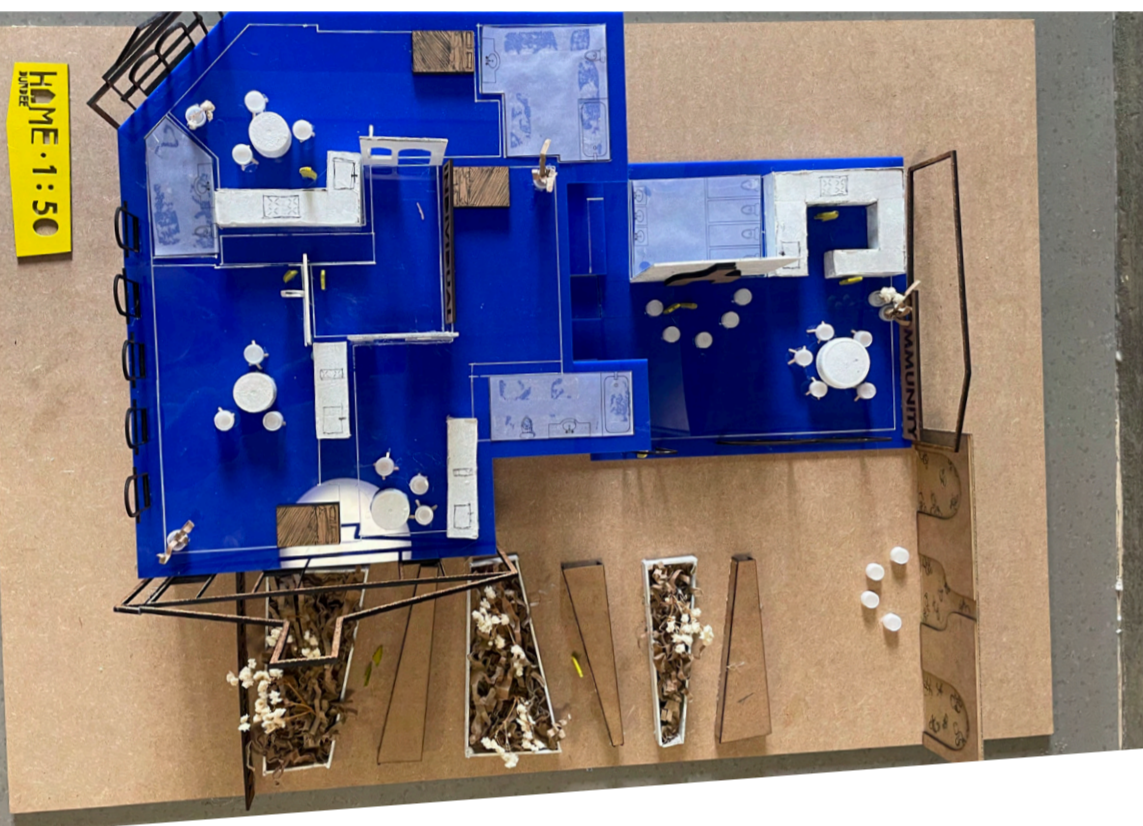
